I have had a fantastic and eventful year, my wife and I have enjoyed the many functions and events that we have attended.





We've had record numbers attending the last two Farmers' Markets which are now being held on the first Saturday of EVERY month. We've got new traders, new sponsors and are working in conjunction with "All About Sawbridgeworth" to promote our town.

A new innovation is the start of a "Park and Ride" service on market days. This facility is in cooperation with the Leventhorpe School. Park your car at the school and hop onto the minibus which will be doing regular runs to the market and back throughout the morning. And it's FREE!

The bus continues to be a popular and well used facility provided by the town council. We are planning our routes for this year and we are starting an additional service from 14 May to serve the Princess Alexandra Hospital and the Herts and Essex Hospital. This service, which will depart from and arrive back at the Bell Street car park adjacent to the Town Council Offices, will initially run on Tuesdays and Fridays only.

Timings for the Sawbobus services can be found at the Town Council, on the Town Council web-site, on the town notice boards, at the GPs surgery, the Rivers Hospital, the library and at Budgens. The fare for the service will be £3 one way or £5 return, wherever you get on or off.

Report by the Town Mayor

The Town Mayor, Cllr Barry Hodges JP, reported on the Activities of the Council in 2012/13.

- This year has been extraordinary as it has seen the town council invest nearly a million pounds in the capital infrastructure of the town.
- First of all the conversion of The Cottage and the building of the new council chamber, with associated offices. This is the first time the Town Council has had a permanent home, up to now we have been itinerant tenants in various parts of the town.

The project which has been completed - under budget - at a total cost of £660,000 has been funded entirely from the proceeds of the sale of redundant allotment land at Millfields. It provides first rate facilities for the town and we hope that it will be put to full use over years to come.

We will be welcoming our local police officers to the first floor and the East Herts Citizens Advice Service to the ground floor on Monday mornings.

- We have a link door to the Hailey Centre and we have signed a 999 year lease on the Centre which will secure its current use for the foreseeable future. It also means that the town council takes over the responsibility for its maintenance which should show an improvement to the exterior looks and integrity of the building.
- We promised to support the repair and refurbishment of the Memorial Hall, again using funds from the sale of the Millfields land. So far we have handed over £138,000 for the project and this has shown a remarkable transformation of the building and ensured that its life has been extended for the benefit of the community.
- We agreed to share the cost of enhancing the Vantorts play area in partnership with the District Council. Despite some initial reservations it has proved to be a great success and has received many favourable comments. The Town Council's contribution was £40,000 using funds from the sale of the Millfields land.
- We planned for and executed the complete refurbishment of the West Road play area at a cost of £30,000 again using funds from the sale of the Millfields land. It is already proving a tremendous success and is an asset to the community.
- We also contributed £25,000 to the Scouts new headquarters

- We managed six **Farmers Markets** throughout the year. They continue to be popular and bring people into the town on market days. We spent £8,000 on our own market gazebos and equipment which are a great improvement on the stalls we previously used. For the next year the markets will be monthly and this was launched with radio adverts and community activities earlier this month. We had over 1,200 visitors!
- Last year's Christmas Lights were bigger and better than ever, we had a street market and over 3,000 people attended this community event.
- Business Association we initiated a new version of the Business Association, but in this format this has not taken off. Recently the town council has supported "All About Sawbridgeworth" a marketing consortium of retailers and businesses, this promises to go from strength to strength
- Sawbobus continues to go from strength to strength and is a well appreciated service. We carried over 2,200 passenger journeys during the year. The routes changed slightly to reflect passenger demand. Thanks to all our sponsors. In May, with the support of the County Council we are launching Sawbobus 2 which will start out by carrying passengers to the hospitals in Harlow and Bishops' Stortford.
- Community Buses we have continued to operate the small community bus for hire by local registered groups. During the year we added another 15 seater to the hire fleet which has been greatly used. This offers really economical transport for local groups with their own drivers.
- We introduced a parking scheme in the Bell Street car park to allow for the first hour's parking to be free. This was an experiment for six months from August now extended to March 2014 as it has proved a real hit with retailers and visitors alike. It does however cost the town council £22,000 a year to subsidise.
- As far as our role in **Planning** is concerned we have given an opinion on 75 planning applications this year taking into account both the East Herts Adopted Local Plan and the Town Action Plan.
- The Town Cemetery development the new extension has been grass seeded, rolled and is being prepared for future use.

 We have opened up a new area for use by families who prefer kerbed memorials. During the last year we hosted 52 interments at our Cemetery which is regarded as one of the best kept in the area.

Mayors visits – during the year I attended many functions of various types. The highlights were: The Queen's Jubilee, v isit to Bry-sur-Marne, the Christmas lights switch on event, the opening of the new Scout hut and visits to schools.

TOWN ACTION PLAN - THE SIX KEY ISSUES

Elsewhere there is a review of progress against the Town Action Plan that was created in 2009. Members have decided not to produce a Neighbourhood Plan, called for under the Localism Bill to complement the District Plan, this because it would cost in the region of £40,000 to produce and would not see a payback from any enhancement of Community Infrastructure levy that it would entitle us to

Instead we will lead the creation of a new Town Action Plan for 2014-18.

The Town Action Plan identified six key issues:

- Roads and Transport -
- Plan Housing Sensibly -
- Car Park Charges -
- Support for the Voluntary Sector -
- Support for Local Businesses -
- Replacement Scout Hut -

Town Clerk's Report to the Annual Town Meeting 15 April 2013


At the Annual Town Meeting the role of the Clerk is to report on the finances of the Council for the year just ended.

In the year 2012/13 the Town Council's Precept was £180,000, this was 61% of the Council' s total income.

The Council derives other income from its operations in the town, such as the Town Cemetery, the four Allotment Gardens and the Community Bus services. Income relating to these other activities amounted to £114,274; and so the Council's to tal income for the year was £294,274.

At the start of the year the Council also held in reserve the net proceeds of the sale of a parcel of land east of Millfields which amounted to £977,184. These monies were ring fenced for capital projects in 2012/13 for the benefit of the community


Our ordinary income is shown in the diagram below. The Council is aiming to continue to develop Operations Income to minimise the need to raise the Precept.



We have used the available resources in the way shown in the diagram below. We spent a total of £313,534 this year on items not including our capital projects programme.

The deficit of £19,260, mainly due to the cost of delays in moving to our new civic hub, has been met from reserves.

Staff costs amounted to 34% of our expenditure; we have two full time employees, three part time administration officers, the town ranger and two part time bus drivers. All other services are carried out by contractors.



Our operations costs were 47% of our spend, and included management of the Town Cemetery, the Allotment Gardens, the two Community Minibuses, the Sawbobus Community transport service, recreation areas, footpaths, the Town Ranger, provision and maintenance of Floral Displays and the Christmas Lights.


Our administration costs at 8% of the total included our responsibilities as a Consultee on planning applications and matters relating to the town, monitoring and action against the Town Action Plan, Fly Posting, Town Council Newsletters, Civic Events, Community Transport, Floral Decorations, Promoting the town, subscriptions, insurances and other matters including meetings, committees and representation on outside bodies including liaison with the County and District Councils.

Our office costs, 7% of the total, related to our use of 49 Bell Street until January 2013. These have been ended now we have been able to give up that temporary tenancy.

During the year, the Council expanded the operation of Sawbobus, which was financed by commercial sponsorship. It planned the start of Sawbobus 2 which will provide a link to hospitals in Harlow and Bishops Stortford. It continues to manage the Farmers Market which will be expanded in 2013/14 to be a monthly market and community event and the two Community Minibuses, both of these activities are self-financing although take up significant administration time.

The Town Council continues to step in to preserve services to the community when other organisations are unable to continue.

The Council made grants totalling £13,400 to five different local organisations during the year, these were the Citizens Advice Service, Bullfields Allotments Association, Sawbridgeworth and Stortford Street Pastors, the War Memorial refurbishment fund and the Memorial Hall dedication ceremony. In addition they made donations totalling £6,000 to support the activities of the Town Twinning Association, the Hailey Centre and the Young Peoples Recreation Centre.



The main capital projects for the year have been the conversion and extension of Sayesbury Manor Cottage into a new centre for the community and a permanent home for the council. We also gave substantial assistance for the repair and development of the Memorial Hall, we redeveloped the West Road play area, and contributed to the development of the Vantorts Park play area, the new Scout HQ and new market stalls. We have some earmarked reserves for the completion of the Civic Centre and Memorial Hall projects.

For this coming year the precept has been increased marginally to £187,500. The increase will make a contribution to the estimated cost of £22,000 that will be payable to EHDC to subsidise the one free hour parking scheme. The rest of the subsidy is made up of economies and savings made elsewhere. Extra income from other operations will continue to be around £100,000, this keeping the precept to parishioners at the lowest level of any town in East Hertfordshire.



A week of 'Pear' related events will be running throughout the town this autumn to celebrate the world renowned **Conference Pear**. The pear was first announced by Thomas Rivers at a Pear Congress in 1885 but the event had been advertised as a Pear Conference, hence the name.
